



GRADUATION

For the second consecutive year, Colby Community College has the highest graduation rates among all Kansas community colleges. The data was reported in the annual Kansas Board of Regents Community College Data Book.

Graduation rates are measured by the percentage of first-time, full-time students who begin and complete an associate degree from the same institution within two or three years.


Colby ranked first in both categories. The college graduated 46.1 percent in the two-year period, which is 9.1 percent higher than the next closest institution. CCC's 47 percent graduation rate in the three-year span also topped the list by 4.6 percent.

## RETENTION

Colby Community College has the highest retention rate among Kansas community colleges (Kansas Board of Regents Community College Data Book), at 68.3%. This is 10.3% above the state average. The retention rate is the number of first-time, full-time degree-seeking students attending CCC for the fall semester who return for the next fall semester.




Retention Rate among all Kansas Community Colleges (KBOR)



## GRADUATE WAGES

Colby Community College technical program graduates earn salaries that rank at the top among their peers from Kansas community colleges, and second among all two-year public institutions, according to the Kansas Training Information Program (K-TIP) report.

Published annually by the Kansas Board of Regents, the K-TIP reveals that graduates of CCC technical programs earned a median income of \$34,171 in 2017. Incomes of Colby grads ranked either first or second since 2014.



Already with the highest graduation rate among all 19 Kansas community colleges, CCC believes the office will help continue the trend and be an asset for student retention. Linda Nelson was named the director after serving as a transfer and advising specialist in

Student Support Services for the previous 16 years.
Several current and retired faculty members will hold office hours.

"The advising center has been a longtime dream, and we are excited to see what we will accomplish," said Nelson. "I am incredibly grateful to the administration and board who saw the value in an advising center and made it happen."

**SPENT ON RENOVATIONS THROUGH 2018** 

Colby Community College opened a renovated 12-bed section of Living Center East with a ribbon-cutting ceremony in August of 2018. The completed project is the second of three phases of improvements to the residence hall.

"We understand comfortable living settings have a positive effect on the quality of the student experience and in their overall success," said Vice President of Student Affairs Dr. George McNulty. "The continued improvement of our residential facilities play an important role in the college's ability to serve students effectively."

The final stage of the Living Center East overhaul is scheduled for completion in August of 2019 and will mark an entire renovation of the college's original dorms built more than 40 years ago.

ocusing on others didn't stop when the matches ended. Following the leparture of fans at home games, the team stayed and helped Community luilding staff pick up trash.


While our girls were still competitive, we made sure we were working lard to love, serve, and care," Jones said. "Because as the girls would say, That's what we do.'"



"Ultimately, being part of the After School Program is the very foundation of our program." stated Grafel. "Character, hard work, and pride are why we do what we do!"







#### **Kansas Board of Regents** Enrollment by Headcount and Full-Time Equivalency **Colby Community College**

## CCC ADDS NEW ATHLETIC FACILITY

Fall 2018 saw the launching of a fundraising campaign for a new facility on the Colby Community College campus. This is the first new facility to be built since 2007.


The Big Blue Barn is an athletic practice/intramural facility encompassing approximately 18,000 square feet. The space will be divided into three different sections: wrestling/basketball, weight room area with locker rooms, and a turf surfaced area for softball and baseball complete with nets that will go up and down. Additionally, there will be a track around the entire perimeter of the facility for indoor options to accommodate track and cross country.

The groundbreaking ceremony for this new facility was held June 3, 2019. The facility will be located on the old baseball fields-immediately adjacent to the on campus living centers.

"Having the facility on campus allows maximum utilization and allows additional flexibility," said Dr. Seth Carter, President of Colby Community College.

"Additionally, Colby Community College is currently the only community college in Kansas without a facility like this on our campus. While our staff do a great job without this facility, it should help in their recruiting and preparation process in the future."

The facility should be complete fall 2019.



Colby Community College is a two-year, public institution of higher education. Located in Colby, Kansas, the College is situated in the northwest part of the state in Thomas County and is approximately 50 miles from the Nebraska and Colorado borders. Once known as the Golden Buckle on the Wheat Belt, Thomas County is now also a leading producer of sustainable agriculture. Although not the largest county in the state by acres, Thomas County has more farmable acres than any other county in Kansas.

From a humble beginning of 99 students in 1964, CCC now serves over 2000 students annually. The College provides a diversity of academic

options and has highly qualified and caring faculty and staff. In addition to an 80-acre main campus, CCC has a 60-acre farm utilized as a hands-on laboratory and training facility.

The College also accommodates off-campus students nation-wide through face-to-face, online, and hybrid courses. A number of studies (SmartAsset, Wallethub, Aspen Institute, and the Chronicle of Higher Education), conclude CCC is a solid educational investment.

Colby Community College is governed by an elected, committed six member Board of Trustees.
