## Reporting a Crime

CCC encourages individuals to report all crimes to the CCC Director of Security and Colby Police in an accurate and timely manner. CCC provides several ways to report crimes or other emergencies to the CCC Director of Security or obtain help. It is the college's policy that the CCC community should file a report whenever they observe anything suspicious, believe they have discovered a crime, or come across a hazard which could cause harm to them or others.

## CCC Security Support

The CCC Department of Security maintains a working relationship with local, county, and state Police.

## Confidential Reporting Procedures

Crimes can be reported on a confidential basis for inclusion in the Annual Security Report. If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the college system or the criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report. The Department of Security can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with your wish to keep the matter confidential, while taking steps to ensure the future safety of yourself and others. With such information, the college can keep an accurate record of the number of incidents involving students, employees, and visitors; determine where there is a pattern of crime with regard to a particular location, method, or assailant; and alert the campus community to potential danger. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crime statistics for the institution.

## CCC Security Education and Prevention

CCC Security encourages the campus community to assist in preventing crime by minimizing opportunities to become a victim by using good judgment and safety practices and by encouraging students and employees to be responsible for their own and others' security.

## Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

The College maintains an Emergency Response Plan (ERP) that contains provisions to provide immediate emergency response and evacuation in an emergency situation. This plan provides that if there is an immediate threat to the health and safety of students or employees, occurring on campus, the Department of Security; Division of Student Affairs; Division of Public Relations; and the Office of the President may, in due consideration of the prevailing circumstances, follow aspects of the ERP notification procedures. The ERP also implements the

Emergency Response Electronic Communications Procedure, which allows for the immediate notification of the campus community upon confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or staff occurring on campus.

The College Emergency Guide is published and distributed annually and provides emergency response and evacuation procedures for each building on campus.

### **Timely Warning Notices**

As an effort to provide timely notice to the CCC community, in the event of a serious incident which may pose an ongoing threat to the CCC community, a timely warning would be distributed to the campus community. As relates to electronic communications the CCC Security can trigger an emergency alert via text messaging and broadcast alerts to all logged on computer terminals. Once the alert is triggered, the Public Relations Team immediately updates the Central College web pages and the Public Relations team sends out notices via email and campus voice mail. These systems are tested annually.

The College publishes annually an Emergency Guide for campus buildings and posts it in all buildings and distributes it to all employees and students.

### **Safety of Buildings and Grounds**

The college's buildings are monitored and patrolled by CCC Security, Resident Coordinators, and Resident Advisors. The Department of Security regularly patrols campus and reports malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions to Maintenance for correction. Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Campus lighting typically meets or exceeds the industry standard for pedestrian walkways. Shrubbery and other vegetation are kept trimmed to avoid obstructing visibility. Other personnel of the college community are helpful when they report equipment problems to CCC Security or to Maintenance. Possession and use of weapons are prohibited on the CCC campus.

### **Fire Safety Report**

### **Access to Campus Facilities: Academic and Administrative Buildings**

The CCC campus is part of the city of Colby and, as such, is generally open to the public. Except as restricted in individual cases, the academic and administrative buildings are open to the public, at a minimum, during normal business hours. Most facilities have individual hours and the hours may vary at different times of the year. Access to some of these buildings is also controlled by card access after normal business hours and all of these buildings have varied levels of access.

### **Access to Campus: Residence Halls**

Access to residence halls is restricted to residents, their approved guests, and other approved personnel of the college community. CCC Security officers patrol the residence halls on a regular basis. Resident Advisors and Resident Coordinators also maintain security measures in the halls and work with residents to achieve a community respectful of individual and group rights and responsibilities.

## Safety in Residence Halls and Campus Buildings

The college provides an effective structure for the protection of students in residence halls. The elements of this system include:

- Door peepholes
- Locked entrance doors
- Available information about steps students can take to maintain their safety
- No visitor requirement for entry between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m.
- Requirement that students escort their guests at all times
- Required programming efforts in areas of safety and security

The college places restrictions on guests, building access, and actions that may have a detrimental effect on student security. Such restrictions include:

- Building entrance only through designated areas
- Prohibition on assisting others to gain unauthorized entry
- Prohibition on propping open doors
- Prohibitions on duplicating or giving a room key to another person
- Prohibition on any activity that would endanger the safety of others

If a student is found to violate any of the above restrictions, the college may impose sanctions or fines on the student.

## Missing Student Alert

If a member of the College community believes that a student is missing, he or she should immediately notify the CCC Department of Security by calling 785.460.5508. CCC Security will investigate, generate a missing person report, enter relevant student data into an appropriate database and involve other law enforcement agencies as necessary. The missing student protocol will be activated within 24 hours of the determination the student is missing. The CCC Security will notify the person identified by the student as the "missing person contact." Only authorized campus officials and law enforcement officers may have access to this information. If the missing student is under 18 years of age, and is not an emancipated individual the CCC Security will notify the student's parent or legal guardian that the student is considered missing. In the event the student has not registered a contact person, law enforcement will be notified that the student is missing and proceed with the investigation.

Each fall semester, students residing in on-campus housing will receive an e-mail and verbal notification of the missing student protocol. This information will explain the related law (with special emphasis on nuances related to students' age and reporting requirements) and encourage students to frequently update emergency contact information, including a confidential missing person's contact, with the college via admissions.

## Campus Security for Non-Campus Locations

Colby Security monitor and record criminal activity at non-campus locations and may work cooperatively with CCC Security and Student Affairs to address problems as they arise.

## Students Governed by Student Code of Conduct

Students are governed by CCC's Student Code of Conduct, which contains policies affecting security on campus. The college has the right to discipline for on- and off-campus actions, up to and including expulsion. ## **Emergency Response Team (ERT)**

CCC has staff that are certified and trained to handle hazardous materials and other types of critical incidents.

## **Alcoholic Beverages**

As a state college, the possession, sale, or furnishing of alcohol on college campus property is governed by CCC policy and Kansas state laws. Violators are subject to disciplinary action and criminal prosecution. CCC prohibits the possession of alcoholic beverages on college premises.

## **Drugs**

The possession, use, sale, manufacture, or distribution of illegal drugs, narcotics, or controlled substances is a violation of college policy and state laws, and violators are subject to disciplinary action and criminal prosecution. CCC is a drug-free and alcohol-free workplace.

## **Education and Prevention**

It is the policy of the college to offer prevention and awareness programming to reduce the risk of sexual violence, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking occurring among its students. Programs offered throughout the year include strong messages regarding not just awareness, but also primary prevention (including normative messaging, environmental management and bystander intervention), and discuss institutional policies on sexual misconduct as well as the Kansas definitions of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking and consent in reference to sexual activity. Bystander engagement is encouraged through safe and positive intervention techniques and by empowering third-party intervention and prevention. Programs also offer information on risk reduction that strives to empower victims, how to recognize warning signals and how to avoid potential attacks, and do so without victim-blaming approaches. Ongoing educational awareness strategies and initiatives are directed to students and employees, including faculty, in the form of campaigns, first semester student success seminars, in-service days, and campus sponsored events.

## **Campus Procedures for Addressing Sexual Misconduct, Dating Violence, Domestic Violence, Stalking, Sexual Harassment and other acts of sex and gender discrimination**

In the event of sexual misconduct, CCC takes the matter very seriously. If a student is accused of sexual misconduct or other gender based violence, which typically include the crimes of rape, acquaintance rape, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, sexual harassment, or stalking, s/he is subject to action in accordance with Sexual Misconduct Policy in the student handbook. Sanctions can range from warnings through expulsion. However, serious and violent incidents and acts of non-consensual sexual intercourse (the policy equivalent to the crime of rape) usually result in suspension or expulsion.

Procedurally, when the college receives a report of sexual misconduct, gender-based violence, or other sex or gender discrimination the Vice President of Student Affairs/Title IX Coordinator is notified. If the victim wishes to access local community agencies and/or law enforcement for support, the college will assist in making these contacts. Protective measures are available whether a victim chooses to report to law enforcement and irrespective of whether one pursues a formal complaint through the college's resolution process. The college employs protection measures in any case where a student's behavior represents a risk of violence, threat, pattern or predation.

The Title IX Coordinator will offer assistance to victims in the form of interim or long-term measures such as:

- Opportunities for academic accommodations
- Changes in housing for the reporting or the responding student
- Arranging to dissolve a housing contract and pro-rating a refund

- Visa and immigration assistance
- Changes in working situations and other assistance as may be appropriate and available on campus or in the community (such as no contact orders, campus escorts, transportation assistance, targeted interventions, etc).

The victim will also be connected with a counselor on-or off-campus, as well as an on-or off-campus victim's advocate. An individual isn't required to take advantage of these services and resources, but the college provides them in the hopes of offering help and support. A summary of rights, options, supports and procedures, is provided to all victims, whether they are a student, employee, guest or visitor.

When appropriate upon receipt of notice, the Title IX Coordinator will cause a prompt, fair and impartial process to be initiated, commencing with an investigation which may lead to the imposition of sanctions, based upon a preponderance of evidence (what is more likely than not), upon a responding student or other accused individual. In any complaint of sexual violence, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking or other sex or gender-based discrimination covered under the federal law, Title IX, the person bringing the accusation and the responding party are entitled to the same opportunities for a support person or advisor of their choice throughout the process, including any meeting, conference, hearing or other procedural action. Once complete, the parties will be informed, in writing, of the outcome, including the finding, the sanctions (if any) and the rationale therefor. Delivery of this outcome to the parties will occur without undue delay between notifications. All parties will be informed of the college's appeal processes, and their rights to exercise a request for appeal. Should any change in outcome occur prior to finalization, all parties will be timely informed in writing, and will be notified when the results of the resolution process become final.

The Title IX Coordinator is ultimately responsible to assure in all cases that the behavior is brought to an end, the college acts to reasonably prevent its recurrence and the effects on the victim and the campus community are remedied. The Coordinator is also responsible to assure that training is conducted annually for advocates and hearing/investigative officers. Training will focus on investigation procedures, sexual violence, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, sexual harassment, retaliation and other behaviors that can be forms of sex or gender discrimination covered by Title IX and Clery Act.

Title IX and the Clery Act provide protections against those who bring allegations of non-compliance with the Clery Act and/or Title IX to the attention of appropriate campus administrators. The college does not retaliate against those who raise concerns of non-compliance. Any concerns should be brought to the immediate attention of the Title IX Coordinator, Dr. George McNulty and/or the Office for Civil Rights. ## Confidentiality

The investigation and records of the resolution conducted by the college are maintained confidentially. Information is shared internally between administrators who need to know. Where information must be shared to permit the investigation to move forward, the person bringing the accusation will be informed. Privacy of the records specific to the investigation are maintained in accordance with Kansas law and the federal FERPA statute. Any public release of information to comply with the open crime logs or timely warning provisions of the Clery Act will not release the names of victims or information that could easily lead to a victim's identification. Additionally, the college maintains privacy in relation to any accommodations or protective measures afforded to a victim, except to the extent necessary to provide the accommodations and/or protective measures. Typically, if faculty members or administrators are asked to provide accommodations for a specific student, they are informed such accommodations are necessary under Title IX or the Clery Act, but they are not given details of the incident. Irrespective of state law or public records access provisions, information about victims is maintained privately in accordance with Title IX and FERPA

## Safety Measures

Anyone with knowledge about sexual misconduct or gender-based violence, which typically include the crimes of rape, acquaintance rape, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, sexual harassment, or stalking, is encouraged to report it immediately. If you are the victim, some or all of these safety suggestions may guide you after an incident has occurred:

1. Go to a safe place and speak with someone you trust. Tell this person what happened. If there is any immediate danger, contact the residence hall on-call number at (785) 443-4594 or 911.
2. Consider securing immediate professional support (e.g.: counseling, victim advocacy, medical services, law enforcement, campus officials, etc.) to assist you in the crisis.

4. For your safety and well-being, immediate medical attention is encouraged. Being examined as soon as possible, **ideally within 120 hours**, is important in the case of rape or sexual assault.
    - (A). To preserve evidence, it is recommended that you do not bathe, shower, douche, eat, drink, smoke, brush your teeth, urinate, defecate or change clothes before receiving medical attention. Even if you have already taken any of these actions, you are still encouraged to have prompt medical care, and evidence may still be recoverable.
    - (B). Typically, if police are involved or will be involved, they will obtain evidence from the scene, and it is best to leave things undisturbed until their arrival. They will gather bedding, linens or unlaundered clothing and any other pertinent articles that may be used for evidence.
    - (C). It is best to allow police to secure items in evidence containers, but if you are involved in transmission of items of evidence, such as to the hospital, secure them in a clean **paper bag or clean sheet**, to avoid contamination.
    - (D). If you have physical injuries, photograph or have them photographed, with a date stamp on the photo. Record the names of any witnesses, and their contact information. This information may be helpful to the proof of a crime, to obtain an order of protection or to offer proof of a campus policy violation.
    - (E). Try to memorize details (physical description, names, license plate number, car description,), or even better, write notes to remind you of details, if you have time and the ability to do so.
  5. Even after the immediate crisis has passed; consider continued support on-or off-campus
  6. Contact the Vice President of Student Affairs/Title IX Coordinator if you need assistance with no-contact



orders or other protective measures. The college will also assist in any needed advocacy for students who wish to obtain protective or restraining orders from local authorities. If you obtain external orders of protection (e.g. restraining orders, injunctions, protection from abuse), please notify Campus Security so that those orders can be observed on campus.

7. If you are a victim and decline to report it to campus authorities or law enforcement please secure medical attention and victim support resources listed in this publication.

## **Sexual Misconduct Policy**

Students, administrators, faculty, staff, guests and visitors have the right to be free from all violence, including sexual violence. Everyone within the campus community is expected to conduct themselves in a manner that does not infringe upon the rights of others. The college believes in a zero tolerance policy for all misconduct, including gender-based misconduct, which typically includes the crimes of rape, acquaintance rape, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, sexual harassment, and stalking. When an allegation of misconduct is brought to an appropriate administration's attention, and a respondent is found to have violated this policy, serious sanctions will be used to reasonably ensure that such actions are never repeated. This policy is intended to define community expectations, to establish a mechanism for determining when those expectations have been violated and to provide recourse for those individuals whose rights have been infringed upon. This policy has been developed herein to reaffirm these principles procedurally and programmatically.

## **Sexual Harassment Policy**

It is the policy of CCC that no member of the college may sexually harass another. It is a violation of both law and college policy. A complete description of this policy can be located in the Policy Manual at <http://www.colbycc.edu/faculty-staff/index>

## **Registered Sex Offenders on Campus**

A federal law, the Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act amendment to the Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act, requires registered sex offenders to indicate when they are enrolled or employed at institutions of higher learning. The law further requires state authorities to provide law enforcement in the jurisdiction where the college is located with a list of registered sex offenders who have indicated that they are either enrolled or employed at the college. ## **Crime Statistics**

The crime statistics were compiled by CCC Vice President of Student Affairs in cooperation with the CCC Department of Security, campus officials having responsibility for oversight of student activities, and relevant local and state Security agencies. Crime definitions are from the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Handbook and sex offense definitions are from the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) edition of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. For statistical purposes, crime statistics reported to any of these sources are recorded in the calendar year the crime was reported. A written request for statistical information is made on an annual basis to all college Deans, Directors, and known Campus Security Authorities. Statistical information is requested and provided to Vice President of Student Affairs by individuals identified as Campus Security Authorities at CCC. All of the statistics are gathered, compiled, and reported to the college community via this report.

CCC Vice President of Student Affairs submits the annual crime statistics published in this report to the United States Department of Education (DOE). The statistical information gathered by the United States Department of Education is available to the public through the DOE website.

## Definitions of Clery Act Crimes

(Crime Definitions from the *Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook* and Sex Offenses Definitions from the National Incident-Based Reporting System Edition of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program)

### **Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter**

The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. NOTE: Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are excluded.

### **Negligent Manslaughter**

The killing of another person through gross negligence.

### **Sex Offenses–Forcible**

Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

### **Sexual Assault**

An offense classified as a **forcible** or **non-forcible** sex offense under the uniform crime reporting system of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

#### **A. Forcible Rape**

The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against the person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).

#### **B. Forcible Sodomy**

Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

#### **C. Sexual Assault With An Object**

The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/ or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

#### **D. Forcible Fondling**

The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

**Sex Offenses–Nonforcible:** Unlawful, nonforcible sexual intercourse.

#### **A. Incest**

Nonforcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

#### **B. Statutory Rape**

Nonforcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

#### **C. Sexual Assault**

An offense classified as a **forcible** or **non-forcible** sex offense under the uniform crime reporting system of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

### **Robbery**

The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

### **Aggravated Assault**

An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could or probably would result in a serious potential injury if the crime were successfully completed.

### **Burglary**

The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or a felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

### **Motor Vehicle Theft**

The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access, even though the vehicles are later abandoned – including joy riding).

### **Arson**

The willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property of another kind.

### **Liquor Law Violations**

The violation of laws or ordinance prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

### **Drug Abuse Violations**

Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadones); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

### **Weapon Law Violations**

The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

### **Hate Crime**

Criminal offense against a person or property motivated in whole or in part by an offender's bias against a race, religion, disability, ethnic origin or sexual orientation.

## **Violence Against Women Act (Additional Offenses)**

### **Domestic Violence**

Felony or misdemeanor crimes of violence committed by a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim, by a person with whom the victim shares a child in common, by a person who is cohabitating with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse, by a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of Kansas or by any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of Kansas.

## Dating Violence

Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim and where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on the reporting party's statement and with consideration of the following factors: the length of the relationship, the type of relationship and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.

For purposes of this definition dating violence includes, but is not limited to, sexual or physical abuse or the threat of such abuse. Dating violence does not include acts covered under the definition of domestic violence. For the purpose of complying with the requirements of this section and section 668.41, any incident meeting this definition is considered a crime for the purposes of Clery Act reporting.

## Stalking

Engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to fear for his or her safety or the safety of others; or suffer substantial emotional distress.

For the purposes of this definition, course of conduct means two or more acts, including, but not limited to, acts in which the stalker directly, indirectly, or through third parties, by any action, method, device, or means, follows monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about a person, or interferes with a person's property.
