RATIONALE

Grading uses the following scale: A=90-100%, B=80-89%, C=70-79%, D=60-69%, F=0-59%

Semester grade is determined one-half by attendance and participation. The other half is based on performance--i.e, examination, presentation, and project scores. Final examination over the final unit of study will be according to the finals schedule, unless otherwise notified. Final Exam will only be administered once.

METHOD OF INSTRUCTION

Instructor will convey to each student an understanding of:

- A comprehensive view of the subject of study
- The scope and historical sequence of the subject of study
- The structure and purpose of the subject of study academically and professionally
- Career opportunities in the subject of study

Textual materials, readings, media, lectures, and group discussions will be used to introduce students to course content. The basis of instruction is student discovery and instructor guidance. The instructor uses a perspectivistic approach. Instruction includes the Socratic Method and Intuitive Learning Techniques, as well as lecture/discussion format. Learning activities to encourage student performance may include service learning, field encounters, active learning, teamwork, and critical thinking exercises.

A portfolio of the student's best work for the semester will be collected throughout the course. All rights in publication remain with the student.

Course work is designed to allow students to apply what they are learning directly to authentic situations related to the course outline. The instructor facilitates the integration of classroom learning within the context of the world beyond the academic setting.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Students will read the entire syllabus and inquire about any further information necessary and attend each class. Keep a record of clear, chronological notes of classroom events, activities, and presentations. Participate in class activities in a positive and sincere manner during class and maintain respect for other students. Students will show due diligence and self-discipline in study habits. Each student is responsible for reading, taking class notes, and doing assignments. Students will turn in assignments when due and arrive on time for each scheduled class. Students will observe and pay attention to the focus of each instructional activity whether it is simulation, lecture, video, or group discussion, etc. The level of competency each student should demonstrate for successful completion of the course is at least the 70-percentile level for a C average.

SERVICE-LEARNING COMPONENT

Any student may arrange with the course instructor and community agency an approved Service-Learning Presentation. Each participating student who chooses this option will plan with the instructor 12-15 hours of volunteer service-learning and report the results as a course requirement.

ASSIGNMENT POLICY

Assignment sheets will be posted. Students are responsible for quality and timeliness. Late work may not receive full credit. Please indicate your name and identify the lesson at the top of the assignment. Assignments will be returned in each student's portfolio.

TEST POLICY

Quizzes, tests, and examinations will be designated during class as online, in class, open/closed file, notes, or textual materials. Make-up tests or quizzes are by arrangement with the instructor.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Attendance is recorded by the regular collection of assignments, projects, quizzes, tests, and examinations. Failure for non-attendance forms will be used according to school policy. Official withdrawal forms should be submitted by the student to obtain refund and change enrollment status according to official deadlines.
