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Rationale: Beginning Photography has been developed to give students experience in learning about cameras and technology associated specifically with photography and digital imagery. Students will become more familiar with the history, principles, current related digital techniques, photoshop, and use in visual arts.

Course Description: This course is a beginning photography course for people interested in exploring the image making potential of digital cameras. Students use scanners, color printers, powerpoint, photoshop CS4, and movie making software as they create/organize files, and perfect photography skills. They will also work on and develop matting and framing skills to complete at least 5 photos to be displayed in the CCC Gallery/Artwalk. This course is perfect for graphic design majors, art majors and portfolio building, and anyone with an interest in photography. Prior knowledge of cameras or computers is required.

Course Outline:

*Capture pics of various subject matter: landscape, cityscape, perspective (1pt, 2pt, atmospheric, foreshortening), shadows showing positive and negative space concepts, reflections, food/drink, portraits (individual posing, non-posing, and group), balance (symmetrical, asymmetrical, radial), pattern made by man/nature, visual illusions, activities showing action/movement/gravity, macro functions, timed pics, panoramic shots, framed shots, combo pics in photoshop, masks and layering, self portrait, and more.

*Students will choose a professional photographer to emulate and recapture in their own photos an idea from the professional images they chose. These will be presented in powerpoint with music, labels, details of idea captured, and citations.

*All pics will be edited in Photoshop or like program.

*At least one example of each subject matter will be put in IMovie (or like program), with transitions set to appropriate music that pertains to the pics and student. Labels, credits, etc will be documented in the movie.

*Students are expected to show at least 5 completed (mat and framed) photos in the CCC gallery/Artwalk.

*Students will take pics of various CCC events to create a semester end review that may be used by CCC for advertising with student permission.

Course Learning Objectives:

A student in the Beginning Photography class at CCC will display a higher level of critical and creative thinking:

- *student will display progression and building on techniques as well as cross-over learning acquired in the studio class and personal experience
- *student will display professionalism and creativity in the completion of all studio work
- *student work will reflect expression of creativity, individualism, and experimentation of materials
- *student will show an understanding of how this medium has changed developed from past to present.

- Utilize computer and digital media technical skills to design a Portfolio of Photography
- Use tools and procedural considerations to produce the latest digital media results

Method of Instruction: Lecture, slide shows, classroom participation, digital media projects, demonstrations, student projects, video, group activities, visual and investigative research, assignments, critiques.

Method of Evaluation: Final Grade Breakdown:

30% Attendance: will be taken each class period. Excused absences are school-approved activities or approved personal reasons. Please contact instructor before class or before the end of the day absent by email or phone/message to be counted excused. Student is responsible for making up work missed. 70% Projects and Final Critique

Course Requirements: Projects: critique every Tuesday, editing on Thursday; all classes must be attended, and edit under class time supervision. You will need to spend extra time in the art studio working to complete each assignment.

Attendance and Participation: Attendance is very important to this course; 30% of your entire grade is based upon attendance and participation.

Assignment Policy: Students are responsible for all information covered during the class. It is your responsibility to complete and turn in all assignments on the assigned due date. It is critical that you manage your time wisely so as to be able to meet all deadlines.
