Rationale

This course fulfills the humanities requirement in the General Education Requirements of The Transfer and Articulation agreements between the Kansas Regents Universities and Kansas Community Colleges.

Course Description

This is a survey course of the world's major religions, religious concepts, and perspectives on life and death. Oral traditions are studied from the prehistoric to the modern era.

Assessment Statement

- 9. Describe Islam, the Quran, the Five Pillars, Jihad, and Islam in politics

Method of Instruction

This approach requires the students to think about religion as objectively as possible. It also requires students to adequately prepare themselves to participate in class discussions. Opposing points of view, even those contrary to your instructor's, which are in good taste, pertinent to the topic at hand, and intended to enhance the learning process are encouraged. As such, this course will be a collaborative effort between the instructor and student. We will engage in lectures, class discussion, critical writing, practical encounters, and video evaluation.

Method of Evaluation

The evaluation of your work will be based upon class discussion, examination, class presence, student participation, and student attitude. The student is advised to attend each class, keep clear notes, and participate in class activities in a positive and sincere manner while maintaining respect for other students.

Student Responsibilities

Citizenship

This class is intended to elicit spirited debate and discussion. You should operate under the assumption that everyone is acting in good faith as to honestly held beliefs. Those beliefs will be respected. Discussions will be issue oriented only and not personal there will be no personal attacks, name-calling, questioning of patriotism or the like. One goal of this course is to teach you to learn how to think and analyze critically and academically, and to be respectful of those who hold differing opinions, even if you strongly disagree with them.

Behavior

Students pay money to take this course, and most of them want to learn. However, sometimes an individual is not primarily interested in learning and disturbs or distracts others during class in a variety of ways, such as talking, and laughing. Therefore, I reserve the right to ask the student to leave class and

to reduce the student's grade by a letter for each incident. This also extends to a student who distracts others, or the instructor, by such things as reading non-class materials, studying for another class or texting. A serious case of misconduct can result in expulsion from this course and a failing grade. Please be considerate of others who are trying to listen, trying to contribute, and trying to learn.

Readings

You must be prepared to discuss the assigned reading for each class. You are also responsible to learn all the reading material assigned, whether or not it was covered in class. So pace yourself, and do not leave your reading until the last minute. You will be required to demonstrate knowledge of the material presented in class, and you must read and comprehend the text.

Food/Drink

Excused Absences

If any academic or athletic event would prevent you from attending class, you **must** notify me and complete the assignments **before the event** in order to gain credit for the scheduled assignments. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**

Written Assignment/Test Policy
